Dr. John Coie "Hope for our Public Schools: the Waterford Initiative"

Dr. John Coie, Professor Emeritus at Duke University, will discuss the preliminary results of a local initiative designed to improve the language skills of preschool immigrants. The Mobile Waterford Project, endorsed by the Santa Barbara School Board and funded by local foundations and concerned individuals, uses a refurbished van as a learning center for preschool children in targeted neighborhoods. The van contains eight computer work stations. Each child has twenty minutes per day at the computer. The initial results show great promise. Dr. Coie brings vast experience to this project. He has worked for more than thirty years with school systems and communities in developing violence prevention programs. He has published more than 100 journal articles and papers on child development and antisocial problems. He has also served on a number of national panels and task forces on violence and its prevention. David Kain will introduce.

Last Meeting: April 16: Charles Chester introduced our speaker, David Stuart, V.P. of International Markets for INTOUCH Health. David studied at the University of Delaware and was previously associated with LTX and Quantum before he moved to Santa Barbara in 1996. Santa Barbara has been the birthplace of a number of impressive technology inventions. In Santa Barbara, David joined Computer Motion as a small startup, which eventually became a world leader in the design of the first minimally invasive surgical robots. Computer Motion ultimately merged with Intuitive Surgical, the very successful provider of the Da Vinci surgical robot. Working with the same team of local entrepreneurs at INTOUCH Health for the last 5 years, David has been responsible for business development and international marketing to drive Remote Presence robotic solutions into the healthcare industry. David shared with us how Remote Presence Robots have enabled the delivery of specialized physician expertise anywhere, anytime.

INTOUCH Health's newest innovation, Remote Presence Robots, provides reliable, real-time two way audio and video connections allowing medical specialists to extend their reach from anywhere in the world. They currently have an installed base of over 200 systems. Several thousand physicians have performed over 100,000 Remote Presence interactions to date

using Windows based P.C.'s. Sure Connect is their platform of IP addressing and firewall protocol management technologies enabling physicians to connect to the robots with a simple point-and-click ease of use. The target areas of application are: Trauma, E.R., I.C.U., post-surgical rounding, and stroke care.

David explained that remote presence is important because this technology addresses a critical situation in the delivery of specialized healthcare services:

- the elder population is living longer, with especially high increases in people aged 85+, and therefore increasing the amount of critical care and specialized expertise required to support the elder population,
- 2. birth rates have remained low for many years, reducing the population of working aged heathcare professionals,
- 3. the availability of specialist care is declining due to increased demand and a non-increasing supply.

Internet bandwidth and internet quality of service is rising. INTOUCH Health uses multidisciplinary technology and expertise to create extended enterprise relationships with hospitals enabling 24 hour support of its Remote Presence robots and PC Control Stations. For example, stroke is a leading cause of death and disability in the world, especially in the elder population. The average cost of lifetime care is \$100,000 for patients who do not receive a standard-of-care therapy within the first 4.5 hours of a stroke. Within these first hours, time is critical for patients to receive appropriate stroke care to save lives and improve outcomes. David cited a case study of the Michigan Stroke Network which has remote presence in 33 hospitals to deliver therapy. The robot costs approximately \$100,000 per year for a turnkey program; the same as the average cost of lifetime care of one stroke patient who did not receive an appropriate stroke assessment and therapy within the first few hours of that event. The benefits of the robot include greatly reduced lifetime cost of care delivery to stroke patients and increase the numbers of saved lives as shown in economic and clinical studies.

UCLA was an early INTOUCH customer; their studies show that this technology allows a small supply of expert specialists to be available "on-call" for diagnosis, consultation and treatment. Through the robotic presence CT scans, vital signs and visual assessments can be seen by experts. The technology can be integrated with electronic medical records and allows healthcare systems resources to be shared everywhere. David showed us a video in which Dr. Neil Martin, Chief of Neurosurgery at UCLA Medical Center, endorses robotic telemedicine and stated that the Remote Presence robot is designed to meet the critical shortage of specialists..

David beamed us into their Santa Barbara robotic training center to show us what it is like to be a doctor using the robot to see a patient's vital signs and images which were of very good quality for diagnostics. Cottage Hospital uses Remote Presence robots in the stroke and neurology units and shares the technology with the Lompoc Hospital. David stated that no robot replaces anything that can be done for a patient in person, but rather enables specialist assessments and care delivery where otherwise a patient may not receive such care.


