

"Beyond Bagels, Lox and Fiddler on the Roof: What is Jewish Culture?"

Charles Greene will introduce Rabbi

February 15, 2018 "Searching for Other Worlds"

Sandra Seale will introduce Dr. Rachel Street, a Project Scientist at the La Cumbre Observatory. Rachel joined the LCO in 2007



and considers herself privileged to have watched it grow into a unique resource for astronomy and planethunting in general.

For her talk, Dr. Street will discuss the discovery of exoplanets. Planets beyond those of our own solar system have long been the stuff of science fiction. We live in the era when fiction has become reality, and astronomers have discovered new worlds by the thousands. Dr. Street will explain how this can be done, as well as take a look at some of the extraordinary systems that have been found.

Rachel graduated from the University of Birmingham in her native UK in 1998, just as the first evidence for exoplanetary systems was being discovered. This inspired her to shift from studying extra-galactic targets to searching for planets closer to home. She completed her Ph.D. at the University of St. Andrews, Scotland in 2002 and moved to Queen's University, Belfast, Northern Ireland, where she was awarded a PPARC Postdoctoral Fellowship to work on the SuperWASP project. This project became the most successful wideangle ground-based survey for exoplanetary transits.

Our Relationship with China: Part 2

Kevin Ryan introduced his son, our well received September 21 speaker, to continue his discussion of the U.S.-

China relationship, now focused on international trade and the tensions between the two countries.

Eric Ryan opened with a quick review of his company, Ryan Security Technologies, and the related companies he has founded over 25 years, to supply security equipment, including screening systems, forensic devices and portable Faraday cages to customers in China.

He discussed points of tension between the United States and China, beginning with the balance of trade, which he believes has little real significance. The important issue, he argues, is balance of payments. Among products in the U.S.-China trade, the United States continues to dominate the high-return research and development phases, and we share with Europe the similarly profitable marketing and branding phases. China is largely limited to low-yield manufacturing. This sharing enables us to compete in world markets and to import affordable consumer products.

Eric mapped some of the complex interactions in world commerce today. He believes that withdrawing the United States from the Trans Pacific Partnership was a crippling decision from which we will not recover for decades. The TPP requires member nations to raise their labor and environmental standards to approximate ours, which would have leveled the playing field in our direction. It was designed as a counterforce to Chinese economic expansion in Asia, which would have protected our interests. Now, China will soon be included and become dominant.

During the question period, Eric was asked how we can reconcile the government's need to access a criminal's phone with a citizen's right to privacy. In his opinion, the conflict is irreconcilable and the right to privacy is more important than criminal investigation, compelling as that can be in the case of a dangerous terrorist.
