Cosmo learned recently that Gil Ashor, a member of the Cosmo community since 1991, passed away on February 6, 2018. His funeral service



is scheduled for Saturday, February 17th, at 2 pm at the First Presbyterian Church, located at 21 East Constance Ave on the corner of State St.

Gil first came to Santa Barbara many years ago when, as a medical student at the University of Pennsylvania, he did an externship at Cottage Hospital. It was there that he met his wife, Carol, who was in training to become a nurse. After a three year stint in the Navy as a flight surgeon, Gil and his wife eventually made their way back to Santa Barbara.

Gil retired early so he could devote his time to serving people in Third World countries. For nine years, he organized annual medical missions to India to do heart surgery. He also served in African countries and Nepal.

Gil was a good man and a good friend to many. We will mourn his loss.

"Searching for Other Worlds"

Sandra Seale will introduce Dr. Rachel Street, a Project Scientist at the La

Cumbre Observatory. Rachel joined the LCO in 2007 and considers herself privileged to have watched it grow into a unique resource for astronomy and planethunting in general.

For her talk, Dr. Street will discuss the discovery of exoplanets. Planets beyond those of our own solar system have long been the stuff of science fiction. We live in the era when fiction has become reality, and astronomers have discovered new worlds by the thousands. Dr. Street will explain how this can be done, as well as take a look at some of the extraordinary systems that have been found.

Rachel graduated from the University of Birmingham in her native UK in 1998, just as the first evidence for exoplanetary systems was being discovered. This inspired her to shift from studying extra-galactic targets to searching for planets closer to home. She completed her Ph.D. at the University of St. Andrews, Scotland in 2002 and moved to Queen's University, Belfast, Northern Ireland, where she was awarded a PPARC Post-doctoral Fellowship to work on the SuperWASP project. This project became the most successful wide-angle ground-based survey for exoplanetary transits.



"Healthcare and the Economy"

Kevin Ryan will introduce Gordon Bjork, PhD, and Daniel N. Ovadia, MD, MPH. Each will offer his perspective and research on issues facing Ameri-

can healthcare policy today.

Bjork has been a member of Cosmo since 2005. Prior to retirement he was the Jonathon B. Lovelace Professor of Economics at Claremont McKenna College. He has been a consultant to



Ovadia has been a sole practicing orthopedic surgeon in Santa Barbara since 1985. He has had an interest in healthcare policy for many years, having developed a relationship with Stanford's renowned healthcare economist

Alain Enthoven. In 2016, Ovadia completed a Master of Public Health program at UCLA.

For his portion of the talk, Bjork will present an overview of the Health Services Sector of the American economy. He will talk about its increase in relative size as a function of demographics, technology, and rising incomes. He will draw some contrasts with the systems of other advanced economies. He will outline possible changes, including a major expansion in Health Savings Accounts, expansion of Medicare coverage, shifting of Medicaid administration to the States, and changes in the organization of employer offered plans.

Ovadia will focus on the basic underlying principles of the ACA (Affordable Care Act or Obamacare) and how Republican opposition has attempted to undermine these. He will discuss the breakdown of healthcare spending in the US, particularly in light of the anticipated nearly doubling of Medicare recipients by 2030. He will also review a recent NYT article that compares the best healthcare systems in the world. Finally, he will offer his own solutions to America's healthcare ills.


GOLF

The tennis group plays doubles four times a week on a private court off 122 Patterson Avenue, behind the office buildings, starting at 7:45 a.m. Mondays,



"Beyond Bagels, Lox and Fiddler on the Roof: What is Jewish Culture?"



Rabbi Steve Cohen, senior rabbi of Congregation B'nai B'rith for 14 years, discussed how many contemporary Jews reject traditional Jewish religious practice and belief, but remain loyal to their Jewish heritage and identity. He commented on non-religious elements that constitute "Jewish culture", and how they have changed.

Before 1800, Jews all over the world lived in self-contained Jewish communities. They spoke their own language (Yiddish in eastern Europe), and consumed their own kosher foods. They had no close friends that were non-Jewish. They often lived in small villages. In cities, they lived in ghettos (Jewish). They celebrated different festivals, had Sabbath on a different day.

In 1800, with the French revolution, the walls of the ghetto came down. Jews were invited to be part of society. However, there were some dramatic experiences, two in particular. In the Dreyfuss Affair in 1894, a French Jewish Army officer was accused falsely of treason. The matter was not resolved until 1906. There was a great deal of anti-Jewish feeling. And then there was the Holocaust. In Germany, if you were a Jew, you were the enemy.

Many Jews came to America in the late 1800's and early part of the 1900's. They held on to their religion, and were proud Americans. In the early 20th century, Jews began embracing science, even though religion and science were in opposition to each other. The vast majority chose science. That debate is alive today.

Some 30 to 40 years ago, there were Jewish neighborhoods in cities. In 2018 Santa Barbara, there are no Jewish neighborhoods. What is Jewish culture? Rabbi Cohen said there is a set of values, usually not shared with non-Jews, but which are certainly practiced by many others. First is a passion for education, including understanding music. When they are very young, Jewish children are read to early and often, as well as encouraged to learn a musical instrument. American Jews are politically progressive, left of center. 75-85% of young Jews in America today marry non-Jews. Many young Jews say, "I don't believe in God, but I am a proud Jew." They do not pray, but are culturally Jewish.
